Pirst, it is common sin. Second, it is a corrupting sin. And third, conquoring this sin.

I. COMMON SIN

When Dante had his pilgrim reach the third terrace upon the purgatorial mountain, that of anger, they found themselves wrapped up in dense smoke. The foet had in mind just as he did pride. Pride was a sin of the eyes. And envy was a sin of the ears.

And now anger seems to become a common sin of the magination. The angry man sets his imagination revolving around some real or unreal fancied wrong. There are some people who think that we ought to be like animals. And you know it is the very nature of animals to growl at one another. Because an animal is forever dissatisfied and restless. And filled with dread and unsatisfied cravings. And sometimes, this is what happens to individuals. We simply cannot stand failure. When friends, or strangers, or enemies - or even members of the family get in our way. It threatens our success. It threatens our ego dream. And we feel that we are compelled to be angry - to hate. And if the stakes are large enough, we get desperate enough to steal or to kill. We get in one another's hair, and those we thought would love us. And they have turned out to be our enemies. And hate takes the place of love.

So as you look at the procession of animals - there is the pride of the peacock.

The envy of a dog. The anger of a wolf. The sloth of an ape. And gluttony of a pig.

All of these modern sins were deliberated upon many many years ago. And anger was one of the most devastating sins because of its common place.

The tiny baby with his fit of temper. And he turns it loose. The little boy who had a tantrum. He upsets the whole family organization. The wife who loses her temper and gets a sick headache. The husband who gets angry, and loses his appetite. Every member of the family is subject to this sin. No one by nature is immune from this disease of human nature. Anger is denounced by the church and condemned - and yet it does physical harm to its victims. It is as dangerous as a rifle.

Because anger brings to much (unhappiness)—God hates anger. (Psalm 37:8)—cease from anger and forsake wrath. Fret not thyself to anywise to do evil. Jesus condemned this. (Matt. 5:22). I say unto you — whosoever is angry with his brother, without a cause, shall be endanger of the judgement. And whosoever shall say, thou fool, shall be endanger of Hell fire.

Until they are possessed with a fit of rage. And then they are transformed into repulsive, irrational creatures. They are more like wild beasts than civilized people. Man ten Marriel Many many years. Doctors tell us that when any human emotion is over stimulated, excessive amounts of adrenalin are supplied by nature, to replenish this drain.

Therefore the person with a violent temper, uses up this extra supply of energy to feed the flame of his passion. Rather than to put out the fire.

This was the problem of Jonah who made the mistake at the beginning of his life and at the ending of his life. He first tried to flee from his commission. He did not want to go to Nineveh. Finally, at the end of the story, he preached. Yet 40 days and Nineveh shall be destroyed. He must have walked through the streets and had little idea that the people would repent. But they did. Now he goes out to the hillside and to watch — and Nineveh repented and the city was saved.

The unexpected turn of events displeased Jonah and he was so angry that he asked God to take away his life. Now he knew that God had been merciful to him, but he was angry with himself, and he was angry with Nineveh, and he was angry with God. There was a shelter provided from the sum. A gourd. And the angry Jonah was soon upset because a worm arrived and the gourd perished. And again, he said, take away my life. God said to Jonah, now you come one, let's reason together. Does thou well to be angry. An angry man cannot see the truth. Jonah replied at once, I do well to be angry even unto death. And Jehovah God said to him, you are angry with the gourd, which you neither made nor created. Which came up at night. And banished at night. Was smitten with a worm. Should I not give consideration to six score thousand persons.

Now here is a man who is a good example of how this common sin invaded, this great man, and marred his work by anger. When a man is angry, he gives all sorts of unrestrained expressions. And certainly this is among one of the most common sins. And we might say, the most dangerous. Because it injures the well-being of man. More than any other sin, it destroys our friendship, and turns our places of peace into war.

II. CORRUPTION

It is not only a common sin that hurt the elder brother, but it had certain corruption with it. It ruined his capacity to witness. His calmness and peace were corrupted. His conversation was corrupt. And his commradship with others was broken.

First, capacity to witness. The elder brother lost his great capacity here.

To witness for God. When he was upset and angry, we know that he had little influence.

Little influence upon others.

You remember the story of Peter who was angry with the Roman soldier. Took a sword and cut off his ear - but Jesus reproved this. They that take the sword shall perish with the sword. Peter was ruining his witness for Christ at that point. It is possible today for Christians because of their temper to lose that capacity for witnessing. A Christian woman was very concerned about her husband finding Christ. The minister spoke to her husband, but his soul was cold. I am not particularily an irreligious man. But if Christianity should make me as my wife, I do not want any part of it. Why, she is full of wrath. Her temper and her irritableness have no flavor at all.

The minister went to the lady in question and told her what her husband had said. She had not realized that her temper had been out of control. She was very repentent about it - and together, they both knelt in prayer while she sobbed out her heart to God. A few days later, the husband had been out fishing, and he came in which his rod over his shoulder - and he accidently hat a costly lamp. Which went crashing to the floor. He stood with his hands over his ears, waiting for the second crash - of his wife's anger, but it never came. He looked up to see his wife smiling as she said, don't worry about it dear, accidents happen in the best of families. You mean, you are met angry as usual he said. No dear, that is all a thing in the past. I'm sorry I have been so impatient. But God is helping me to control my anger now. A few Sundays later the husband joined the church. Her testimony had been strengthened. Her anger been controlled by the spirit of God.

Anger will hurt your capacity to witness Moses for example, injured his when the people murmurred and asked for water. The command to strike the rock of Horeb.

out of all patience with the people - Moses struck the rock twice, as if the rock had been the head of the people. Crying out, as he did so - hear ye rebels. Now this burst of anger cost Moses the privilege of leading the folks into the promised land. Because of this transgression, they wandered in the wilderness. And he did not have the opportunity to go in.

Now that is not the first one nor the last one, that a promised land of happiness or witnessing has been lost, through anger. And Moses lost it there.

Think about Naaman he had anger. He had come from Samaria, in his chariot.

He thought that Elisha would go out and wash him and cure him. But he told him, go and dip seven times in the Jordan. Why, he said, I thought he would come out surely in the name of his God. Wash in Jordan. Why if that is all that is necessary, there is plenty of rivers back in Syria where I can wash. I imagine that he pulled out his whip and layed it upon his horse, and his chariot plunged forward. Leaving a cloud of dust. But very fortunately, Naaman, had a servant who had good sense. And he said, now wait a little while. Think about this. Reason about it. If the prophet had bid thee to do some great thing - thou would have done it. But to go wash like as a simple child. He finally went, and his flesh became as a little child. How marvelous. We lose our capacity to witness. When anger takes over and you are going to miss a lot of blessings this way.

The bad thing about losing your temper is, that other things are often lost with it. When temper rages, your good expression goes. When temper rages, your reputation sometimes goes. Sometimes your friends go - sometimes your opportunities go. Sometimes, your witness or testimony goes.

Think about Cain who murdered his brother. He was one of the first men to get angry on the pages of the Bible. And Christ warned men about being angry with their brothers, and against other people. But this was the way of crime - these two brothers had brought an offering. And Cain was very angry. Here you have the natural history of anger going to work.

First, it was in his heart. Second, it showed in his face. His countenance was fallen. And thirdly, it was shown in the deed that he committed - he murdered his brother. God said to him, why are you angry. Cain, like many other angry men, would not listen to reason. But his head was filled with passion. And the first murder was committed.

Here was a trail of misery - the crime of ancer. What happened to him. Why, he had to go out from the presence of the Lord and become a fugitive. He lost all of the calmness and the peace which he had. Anger drives men out and separates them from God and from other men. And they become lonely individuals. This is how corrupting this sin is.

Too many people are guilty of this sin. Though we excuse ourselves by blaming our uncontrollable anger, on our natural disposition. Deep down inside, our conscience tells us that it is wrong. And there is a conviction that we are grieving

the Spirit of God.

Falaam who was a gifted eloquent man, was going as an ambassador with Balak, who wanted his to curse the Israelites. He was riding his ass along the highway toward Moab. The angel of the Lord stood in the path. With a drawn sword. Now he did not see the angel, and he encouraged the ass he was riding, which turned out of the path, and he fell upon beating her with his staff. Now this only made matters worse. The ass thrust herself against the wall and crushed the prophet's foot. Where upon Balaam, renewed his blows, and his anger. And he wished that he had a sword in his hand that he might kill the ass. What a picture, that is, of a man losing his temper. Confronting circumstances that were not pleasant. But here was a beast, and the old prophet lost all of his calmness, even an ass was wiser than the man. The real trouble was not with the beast but with Balaam himself. For the angel of the Lord was there to rebuke him, and did you know that is often the case.

A man who has a violent temper and he gets angry at someone else. He really ought to be angry with himself. The source of his own trouble and sorrow.

Balaam finally had his eyes opened. He could not discern the angel, that his own ass was trying to avoid. And that's how it is with anger.

Third, conversation is corrupt. Not only is our capacity to witness, our

calmess corrupt. We find even our conversation is corrupted. As in the tale of the

elder brother. When the prodigal was coming home from the far country, and his rags had to be burned in the stable yard, the best robe had to be put on him. A ring on his hand. And shoes on his feet. And the fatted calf killed - that everyone might have the opportunity to sit down to the music that was inspiring. The elder grother was angry. He would not go in. His conversation was corrupt. And he began to speak out against his father. His place at the table was empty. He shut himself out from the banquet. He would have nothing to do with reconciliation. It bught to have been one of the happiest days of his life - but it was one of the most miserable days. But his conversation was corrupt.

Fourth, commradship was corrupt. This means friendship is commradship. Because of anger, this was destroyed. Here they had been living together, working together, and all of this is destroyed because of his burst of anger. Did you know, this can undo what one has built up through the years.

Priendships that have been long-standing, that have had branches that have born pleasant fruits. Can be blasted and withered by one unexplained explosion of anger.

You can inflict some insult and destroy it.

They were at a big banquet, and this man had a long chapter in his life, of a weakness of alcohol. And he began to talk about how he saved the life of Alexander in a recent battle. And he began to brag about his own fame. These remarks stung Alexander - he reached for his sword, which somehow one of the officers had hidden away. And then in his anger, he fell upon this man - and smote him with his fist. But before he could inflict hurt, the friends of that half intoxicated officer heard him out of the banquet hall. But soon, he entered by another door and stood under the curtains. Quoting lines from a Greek poet. Quick as a flash, Alexander smatched his speake, from the hands of

the guard and held it at the figure. By a raised curtain - and soon his friend of his childhood, his life-long companion, and rescuer lay gasping out his life. Alexander, himself, drew out the sphere. And would have fallen upon it - but his officers prevented it. All through the night and the next day he was filled with remorse. Alexander the Great had conquored the world but he could not conquor himself. And his anger had destroyed his commradship and friendship. And when a man becomes angry, a wise friend can do him a great service. Doth thou well to be angry, the servant said to Naaman. They were words that came to Jonah. And they were words that reasoned with Cain.

Anger is very corruptive. Paul said to the Christians - be angry and sin not.

You remember that Jesus condemns the Pharisees and Scribes and over turns the tables,
of the money changers in the temple. And drives out with whips of cords.

You think of the anger today in fran- as lives are being taken. You think of the anger in Germany when thousands of Jews were destroyed.

We need to have anger toward the things that are sinful. But how foolish it is, and how corrupting it is.

We could illustrate it with two youths. Two young people spinning a top. They were alternating. And then they began to quarrel about their turns. Ceased in a rage, one of them pulled out a sharp knife from his pocket, and killed the other. One boy lost his life and the second boy became a murderer. Merely to settle whose turn it was to spin a top.

People grow very angry over senseless things. We find that even a salky youth

III. CONQUEST OF ANGER

I need not say further about this common sin. You are well acquainted with it.

The corruption of it - you have probably had some of the results of it, in your own

life. But how are we going to conquor this. What is the conquest. How are we going to subdue this. Let not the sun go down.

There are several ways that we might think about subduing and controlling this matter of anger. One way is, first, a desire to get rid of it. There must be some desire within your disposition, to get rid of this by faith. Because anger gets things out of control. Just like a wild sea. And this would no doubt be the first step. I will do something about this unruly temper of mine. Which means that you have stopped justifying yourself. Quite often people say, my whole family is quick-tempered. Or I (inherited this from my mother.) Or everyone else loses his temper some time or other. What is wrong with that. You must recognize that it is an ugly sin in the eyes of God. And in your own sight - and you must have some kind of desire to get rid of it. It is tot enough to say that all of us have an outburst of temper. There is not one person who does not have temper. But you need to know this - there is one person who has learned how to master his temper. There are other people who have not learned this.

And this is what we want to find out.

Third claiming Christ's promise, for this victory here. Anyone who has anger will know that it is unrighteous and it is unChristlike. Now God in his love, and his mercy has promised us - and people do not have to be spineless to be victorious over this. Because the tongue can use profanity as well as praise. The hand that hurts can become the hand that heals.

That is exactly what Vesus meant when he said, blessed are the meek. Do you remember Peter before the resurrection. He swore in the camp of the enemy that he did not know Jesus. He denied him. He became enraged at this. And this angry spirit was a poor witness as a Disciple. But after the Spirit of God came upon his heart later, never again do we find that he was employed in anger and this sort of living. Never did he raise his hands to violence. Or his voice to deny his Lord. Never did his feet walk with the wicked. But he spoke the mighty word of God.

Now meekness means actually to be under the control of the spirit of God.

It is like a wild animal that has been tamed - so the spirit of God can tame, your tongue, your mind, and your temper.

If somehow, vou could see yourself, as others see you, in your violence it might help you. I read the story of a woman whose husband was drunk and she resolved to reveal him to himself. She knew what he was. The children knew what he was. But he didn't seem to understand it. In all of his rage and his anger against the family, she made a photograph of him. The next morning, she had it exhibited on the breakfast table. The disclosure of this, caused that man to make a reformation.

Julius Caesar they say, when he was tempted or provoked would repeat the Roman alphabet before he uttered a word. That is pretty good advice - when you are angry, count to 20 before you speak.

It is strange that some people with an attack of the foothache it gets rid of all of their sainthood. And we blame our anger on the toothache or we blame it on heredity. Or we blame it on some other cause. One wise person said, it is first wounded vanity. Second, real or imagined injustice. And third, blocked behavior. We all have a great desire to be great. And anything that wounds—our vanity irritates us. As a sales clerk. Or as parents who are frustrated by children. We find that we soon lose our dignity.

He was between a rock and a hard place. Moses had an unruly mob on his hands quarreling with him for water, and about to stone him for bringing them out into the wilderness to die of thirst. From their miraculous deliverance at the sea, they had moved deeper into the wilderness, setting camp at an oasis, only to run out of food. In that crisis they had questioned God's purpose with them, wishing they were still back in slavery. Yet, God responded with the gifts of manna and quail. Now, in a new camp, they had a new crisis -- their water supply had run short. And so they ask the recurring question: Is the Lord among us or not?

We know how that feels. A congregation which has enjoyed decades of growth and esteem in ministry, suddenly finds itself in a different situation. Changing demographics, economic realities, changes in leadership, all bring a decline in church attendance and rolls. What was for so long assumed is now questioned. Has God forgotten us, turned to other sources of witness, or taken up leadership in ministry with a congregation other than our own? We scramble for solutions, devise new goals, continually measuring the moment by the triumphs of the past, and ask "Is the Lord among us or not?"

We encounter a personal crisis and question God's presence, providence and purpose in our lives. Working hard at a career, and experiencing some success, suddenly there is an acquisition which results in downsizing, and we find ourselves out on the street, looking for employment. In this city, it is especially treacherous. Suddenly we are unsure of all that here-to-fore we took for granted. We question everything -- our ability, our future, our very identity -- and wonder what sense it makes to speak of God being aware that we exist, much less continuing to care for us. Is the Lord among us or not?

We move through life managing its minor hardships, never questioning the gift of health, only to be suddenly confronted with a life-threatening illness -- be it ours or the health crisis of a loved one. Is the Lord among us or not? For some of us, miraculous moments come, but always surrounded by the hovering fear that the illness may return at any moment. For others, we move more deeply into our orivate wilderness, coming to realize both how precarious and precious life really is.

These lessons today answer that question. They tell us this is precisely what we are to do. Moses is the model here. Though tempted to take it personally, he makes the only move possible to him in such a situation, Moses takes the crisis to God. It is more than an adroit move to avoid stoning. It is the fundamental reflex of faith! "What am I to do?" he cries out to the Lord.

Notice the answer: "Go on!" Keep moving. I have not abandoned you. God says, "I will be standing before you on the rock at Horeb. Strike it and you will find water."

Moses went on, and found God standing on the rock at Horeb. As he struck it, water poured forth. It was not the last time Moses would find himself in such a crisis. But each time he cried out, he discovered God's presence with him, leading and saving.

Whatbetter illustration of the Gospel is there than this? God comes to us in Jesus Christ -- regardless of our circumstance -- and offers us the Spirit to dwell in us, well up within us, gradually transforming us, so that we finally become in reality who we are declared to be -- women and men who have been reconciled to God. Between a rock and a hard place, she stayed in the conversation, maintained the link, and embraced his gift. She discovered not only the Messiah, but God's presence in the flesh. A spring of living water welled up to spill over into her life, giving her new life.

In this well Jesus Christ meets each of us. His gift has not changed. He gives us himself. As we ask "Is the Lord among us or not?," he says "Go on! I will be standing before you on the rock!" As we trust him, keep conversation with him, worship God in and through him, we discover his presence with us. We discover him present to sustain us in our mission as Christ's hody in this city, to sustain us in those moments when we have lost confidence in ourselves, to give us hope in those moments when we have lost confidence in life itself. Thirsts are quenched and crises are endured. Life is not only renewed in hope, it is transformed.

Are you between a rock and a hard place? Go on! God is standing before you on that rock. God is there

only to run out of food. In that crisis they had questioned God's purpose with them, wishing they were still back in slavery. Yet, God responded with the gifts of manna and quail. Now, in a new camp, they had a new crisis -- their water supply had run short. And so they ask the recurring question: Is the Lord among us or not?

We know how that feels. A congregation which has enjoyed decades of growth and esteem in ministry, suddenly finds itself in a different situation. Changing demographics, economic realities, changes in leadership, all bring a decline in church attendance and rolls. What was for so long assumed is now questioned. Has God forgotten us, turned to other sources of witness, or taken up leadership in ministry with a congregation other than our own?
