## *How to Look at a Seminary*

When you look at a theological seminary, what do you see? Buildings, classrooms, library books, offices, dormitory rooms? Places of heightened spiritual growth, and deepened vocational commitment, where worship is accented and enthusiasm is accelerated?

Southern Baptists' six seminaries are all of these. But that is not the whole story. The seminaries are best understood in terms of the young Christians who study there—men and women called out of the churches to prepare for many kinds of ministries in a needy world.

Meet some of these 5,000 seminary students:

- A tall, sensitive young man from Mississippi who counsels a juvenile offender in a detention center, learning how to deal with the crushing problems of the inner-city jungle . . .

- An attractive, vivacious Texas girl who ponders a theological textbook, working out a deeper understanding of the message she is preparing to teach as a youth director in a church.

- Two Georgia students carrying on an animated discussion of the best way to preach a sermon on forgiveness . . .

- An eager mission volunteer from Arkansas . . .

Study toward church vocations would be only a dream for many of these 5,000 seminary students if it were not for the Cooperative Program support of Southern Baptists.

"I simply could not have come if the Convention had not provided free tuition at the seminary," a student said, admitting he and his wife had lived mostly on peanut butter sandwiches the first month to save money.

"I like the way the Cooperative Program provides a full tuition scholarship from *all* the churches for *every* student, no matter where he comes from or what he has," said another.

Freedom from tuition allows future ministers time to serve churches in part-time jobs, gaining experience and meeting needs at the same time. Students also have more time to study and better prepare for the task God has called them to.

As one student put it: "You have the feeling that Southern Baptists are really trying to minister to people in all kinds of situations by the way they provide money to the seminaries to train men and women to do a lot of different tasks in the church."
