All of our Adult 3 teachers have been overworked this year trying to visit and meet the needs of 40 to 50 people.

Additional class space is needed. Finding additional classrooms in our building is one answer. Using sound proof folding doors to subdivide the fellowship hall is another possibility. Perhaps there are others.

We definitely need to give these workers and classes some relief. They have been faithful in their task. Now is the time to organize new classes for continued growth.

Our nurseries are also crowded. They are on the first floor, too. We will consider them in future issues of the MESSENGER.

Plus putting two dents in the door, and knocking off the paint, it missed my arm by about eighteen inches. Thus even the by-products are dangerous. With drunken drivers to duck and beer cans to dodge, it is no longer safe to travel the highways. One in every five highway deaths is due to drivers under the influence of alcohol.

The City Planning Commission will hold a public hearing Monday, July 24, at 8:00 p.m. on the application for a Use Permit for a new ABC Store. The meeting will be held at the Commission office at 10 Admirals Road.

The store is planned by the Virginia Alcoholic Beverage Control Board for the new Ford Plaza Shopping Center.

This hearing will afford residents an opportunity to express their opinion about the need for the store in our city.



The establishment of a Music Council in our church last week was a big step for our Music Ministry. The work of the council will differ from that of the music committee, whose primary function will be in the air of paid music personnel and providing suitable physical facilities as are needed year by year through the budget. The committee can serve with the council in the broader aspects of promotion, enlistment, and general policies as related to the whole church.
