


Artist's conception of Auditorium interior, before it was first enlarged.


Great hymn singing and music that honors the Lord, has become a thing of the past in the B.W. Spilman Auditorium. Secular concert websites now list the "Spilman Auditorium" as a venue for secular musicians to hold their rock and hiphop music concerts.

The B.W. Spilman Auditorium at Ridgecrest, goes "contemporary," with theater lights, concert sound system, and gospel "rock" acoustics to match.



Ridgecrest is now managed by "Contemporary Worship-minded" individuals, who have no respect for the real Baptist tradition. They have allowed hard rock and hip-hop musicians, like "Needtobreathe," to perform "concerts" in the B.W. Spilman Auditorium for profit. Investigation of these groups indicates their endorsement of questionable/secular musicians, who do NOT love the Lord Jesus Christ. *Programs* here are, indeed, *performances*, not worship that honors God.

Tickets to "Spilman Auditorium" concerts are offered online at such websites as, "JamBase" and "Eventective." These sites have, on the same web page, information about local taverns, and other places of questionable Christian behavior, for the concert-goer to be aware of.





Of course, today's Ridgecrest Staff, seen in this photo, are the minimum wage employees that support all these rock concerts/events.

Lifeway Ridgecrest Baptist Conference Center is now being used to facilitate the replacement of traditional worship with contemporary 'Christian' rock, in churches across the Southern Baptist Convention.

"Worship Leader Bootcamp" is offered this year (2013) at Ridgecrest with conference leader, Kenny Lamm, senior consultant for worship and music for the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina. He claims 23 years as "worship pastor" of Front Street Baptist Church in Statesville, North Carolina, although he is not listed on their website. He touts his brand of contemporary worship with his own blog, which includes a detailed section titled, "Worship Wars" where he writes detailed advice on how to derail traditional worship in a church, and install contemporary rock music.

He even includes details on what the worship leader needs to do to orchestrate this wholesale derailment, from what equipment to buy to how to use it. Needless to say, he has been given an entre into SBC's Lifeway Ridgecrest to promote his avowed purpose of bringing the contemporary rock sound into the sanctuary, of as many churches as possible.

Lifeway Ridgecrest Conference Center executives, in addition to not vetting the rock group singers that grace the Spilman Auditorium platform, have not vetted a key resource book being touted for their "Lifeway Worship Leadership Conferences." The book, **"Experiencing Worship,"** written by **Steve Newman**, has *two graduate degrees from an online diploma mill*, and his agenda is to transform all church worship into the contemporary style.

Lifeway Ridgecrest Conference Center continues to pander to the worldly rock and roll entertainment of today, by allowing such groups to use the Spilman Auditorium at "2013 Centrifuge:"

"The Museum," a 'Christian' rock group, is named for a museum they visited during the Romania revolution.



"Rush of Fools," is a Christian rock/ contemporary music band from Alabama. The band, which bases its name in 1 Cor. 1:26-31, is interesting, in that it seems to be an incongruous name, when juxtaposed against what standard Bible commentaries say about the interpretation of those verses.



Thomas and Dita Rose, a bi-racial couple, and their rock band, "The Rose Factor," is involved in "Kickstarter" a plethora of cultural/art/modern film initiatives that invite you to pledge money to. From their website: "The filmmakers, musicians, artists, and designers you see on Kickstarter have complete control over and responsibility for their projects. Kickstarter is a platform and a resource; we're not involved in the development of the projects themselves. Anyone can launch a project on Kickstarter as long as it meets our guidelines."

These "Kickstarter" initiatives are secular in nature and have nothing to do with evangelization of the lost.

Hippie 'Christian' rock singer "Matt Papa," who is to appear at the Spilman Auditorium in July of 2013, has endorsed on his website such questionable people as secular singer Justin Bieber, Joyce Meyer, the jet-setting charismatic prosperity-gospel preacherette, who teaches an off-brand charismatic religion, and Rick Warren of the "feel good, purpose-driven religion," whose books have taken scripture quotations out of context. Warren is the one who said that God enjoys rock music! At Saddleback Church, Rick Warren offers a jazz service for jazz lovers. A rock-n-roll service for rockers. Based on a mistranslation of Acts 5:42, Warren claims he's following the apostles who provided different kinds of services in separate 'courts' of the temple.

Yet just as clearly as a march tune fits a military scene, jazz fits a night club scene and rock fits a festival scene, so there is a certain kind of sound that suits a prayer meeting - and it's not the rock, rap and jazz sound that the purpose driven church has borrowed from the world.

Music that has a corrupt origin, employs sensual rhythms and is accompanied by a fleshly breathy style of singing, with singers who scoop and slide from one note to another, is utterly unsuitable for the spiritual praise of God.

But this is exactly what is happening now in the B.W. Spilman Auditorium at Ridgecrest.

In a taped, online interview, on the Ridgecrest website, the current director (Byron Hill, Executive Director, LifeWay Conference Centers and Camps) clearly states that he is is favor of opening up Ridgecrest to all "evangelical" groups (whatever that means.)



Ridgecrest has lost sight of it's intended purpose: it now hosts
Bishops and Rectors of the Episcopal Church!



And one of those "groups" invited into the Spilman Auditorium in 2012, is one of the leaders of the Episcopal Church, no less. Ordained a priest in the Diocese of Sydney, Australia, **Dr. Youssef** founded The Church of the Apostles. His "service" in Spilman concluded with a hands-on healing service, which is doctrinally suspect. (The Rt. Rev. Dr. Foley Beach was consecrated on October 9, 2010, at the Church of the Apostles, in Atlanta, Georgia, the church that Dr. Youssef is the Rector of.)

Trying to be inclusive of every group imaginable, the Ridgecrest Conference Center leadership now invites the Boy Scouts (since 2003) to use the facilities for a pow-wow and Order of the Arrow activities.

It also has allocated space for Mormons to meet in one of it's largest facilities, Rhododendron Hall. Those of Jewish faith also met at a Ridgecrest facility.

"Indian Summer 2011 will be held at the Ridgecrest Conference Center, Asheville, N.C. the week of August 1 – 6, 2011." (Source: Boy Scouts website).

The Order of the Arrow of Boy Scouts includes this interesting statement in their registration material:

"Use of the LifeWay Ridgecrest Conference Center for this event does not imply alignment with, or endorsement by LifeWay Christian Resources of the Southern Baptist Conference."


From their Brochure:

retaining wall, and trails."


From their brochure: "Religious Services Held"

As the girls and their sponsors gathered in the Spilman Auditorium at LifeWay Ridgecrest Conference Center, the key word for the evening was *prayer*, and the theme was "Project I DO" (India Dowry Offering).

The IPHC newsletter states:

Everything on Friday focused on weddings. The first order of business was to auction off four wedding veils. Each veil was to be auctioned twice, once on Saturday and again on Sunday. The winning group would then choose a person to wear the veil that entire day. Bidding was fierce

From the "Tsunami Ministries" website:


This statement proves that "Tsunami Ministries" has no concept of what "Worship" is, and by Ridgecrest officials not properly vetting this organization, they don't either.

"A rock band, a DJ, a tattooed club singer (Benton Blount), "emcees to get you on your feet, and 'get the party started,"" and a mission statement, that says nothing about confession of sin and redemption through the blood of Jesus Christ; but, and I quote, "everyone can lead worship!"
