In 1892 Rev. H. N. Quisenberry was pastor of Berkley Avenue Baptist Church, where he served until 1895. This was his first pastorate. He was truly a man of God with a vision of missions.

There was no Baptist Church in the area of South Norfolk. Rev. Quisenberry felt there was a need for a mission to serve those of Baptist faith.

Under the leadership of the Holy Spirit he led his church to establish Christian work in the thriving new community of South Norfolk.

Rev. Quisenberry went on to become pastor of a number of Baptist Churches and was President of Stephens College, Columbia, Missouri.






William Brooke Duling May 16, 1895 March 27, 1898




S. S. Robinson February 5, 1899 April 20, 1902









BRIEF HISTORY OF SOUTH NORFOLK BAPTIST CHURCH

Visions of things to come may be gained only through a knowledge and understanding of the past. We are told that an understanding of history enables us to interpret the present and look forward to the future with confidence and courage. The present state of things is a result of the past and it behooves all of us to pause at frequent intervals to inquire as to the source of the good we enjoy or the evils we suffer.

The history of any church is a story of many people and their service to God, community and country through their Church. Some of these people are mentioned. However, there are many more who contributed much to make South Norfolk Baptist what it is today.

The birth of the church began on this order: Rev. H. N. Quisenberry, pastor of Berkley Avenue Baptist Church became interested in establishing Christian work in the thriving new community known today as South Norfolk (part of Chesapeake). With the aid of outstanding laymen such as Mr. John Privott and Mr. E. J. West the work was launched on July 1, 1892. A building was erected at the total cost of \$2,000.00 and opened for worship on January 5, 1893. This chapel was formally dedicated June 11, 1893 at 3:30 P. M., at which service a special offering was received that amounted to an amazing sum of \$550.00. The Sunday School grew steadily and it was reported 162 present in the March 2, 1893 issue of The Religious Herald. Another note of interest recorded in the January 5, 1893, copy of The Religious Herald, stated that the plans for the chapel were drawn by Benjamin D. Price of Philadelphia and the furniture was furnished by George S. Perry of Boston.

The mission was organized into a fully constituted church on November 30, 1893. Members voted the name of the church would be South Norfolk Baptist Church. Work began in writing a Church Covenant and Church Constitution.

January 28, 1894 Rev. C. W. Mathews was called as the first pastor. At a called Business Meeting, Sunday, April 30, 1905, it was

decided not to build a new church but to add an extension to the present edifice at the cost of about \$1,500.00. The annex would be 28'x30' and a baptismal pool and a steeple would be added.

The church was destroyed by fire June 13, 1914. The congregation had in contemplation the erection of a new church edifice and had been raising funds for that purpose for some time. On October 13, 1914, with \$10,000.00 on hand, ground was broken for the present church building. After selecting a plan with which to begin this work, the congregation rejected all bids for the work and the members erected the building with Johnson Brothers Contractors supervising at a cost of \$20,000.00 including the furnishings. The Dedication Service was held July 4, 1915.

On April 24, 1920 the church voted to start a mission (Southside Baptist Church). On June 20, 1926 they voted to erect a building for the mission at a cost of \$2,500.00.

In 1924 the church parsonage was erected on Chesapeake Avenue.

In 1953 a building program was started to make space for Sunday School with a balance of \$100,000.00 in the building fund, the church voted to build our present Educational Building. The cost of the building, including the furniture was \$265,000.00. The first services were held February 13, 1955.

On July 10, 1961 the church voted to reach out into the Princess Anne Plaza area of Virginia Beach. With a loan of \$50,000.00 land was purchased and a chapel erected. The chapel was organized into a church May 26, 1963, with Rev. Melvin Hughes, brother of Rev. Frank Hughes, Jr.

Today as we remember the vision the pastors and laymen of South Norfolk Baptist Church had, how can we not "Take Hold Of Tomorrow" to build not only churches but people to the glory of God.
