

Isaac.



"Next to the word of God, music deserves the highest praise. The gift of language combined with the gift of song was given to man that he should proclaim the word of God through music. . ." — Martin Luther.

Those lines were written at a time when the foundations of Christianity were being tested. They are worth thinking about today when people are falling for everything new as substitutes for sacred music.

Some folks clamor for worldly types of music in the church. They look upon it as entertainment or background music of a shopping mall.

Music is the one common and universal language expressing our emotions and ideals. It is pleasing to man's ear and helps him praise plus appreciate the manifestations of God.

We are all aware of the melodies of nature. There are symphonies in the winds and rains. The fields on a summer night are filled with a thousand lullabies. There is music in the gentle lapping of the water against the boat and the ripple of water over the rocks of a brook. I have heard hunters say there was music in the voice of hounds during a chase. Did you ever hear the melodies of the wind in a pine tree or thicket?

Man's ideals are expressed, and are known by the kind of music he produces. The Scholar, musician and writer, Eric Routley, says this: "... I am constantly coming upon people in all sections of society who would rather hear what pleases them than hear the truth." Often you hear some one say the music is too "high-brow."

However, we need to remember the music presented in our services has been well rehearsed before it is presented.

We should think of this music not as entertainment but a means of worship. God loves the best for worshipping Christians. It should go beyond "tickling of the ear" and bring us in touch with The Gospel!

Fifth, a Christian is one who will be admitted to Heaven. Having accepted Christ, Christ will accept him in glory. Having been "faithful unto death" Christ will give him that "crown of life."

"Other People" — is a daily concern for people in public service. In fact, it should be a constant Christian virtue. There are many good points of contact included in this thought.

First, other people's troubles. Heb. 13:3. "Remember them that are in bonds, as bound with them." This is a real test of love, a willingness to share another's suffering. We have a great word in our language called "sympathy". The true meaning of which is to share and suffer the feelings of another. The selfish man says, "I have troubles enough of my own. Why should I be concerned with yours?" When a person has been through deep waters he understands what it means to have a friend stand by sharing without reserve in the sorrow.

Second, other people's sins. Most of us are shrewd observers of other people's sins. We are also gifted in our denunciation of them. Few are willing to confess their own sins, but prompt to condemn other people's sins. The Christian is under obligation to hate sin and love the sinner. Pray for and witness to others and remember Jesus was a "friend of publicans and sinners".

Third, other people's happiness. It is a sad day when we cannot rejoice in another person's happiness. So many make comparisons and limits his rejoicing to the good fortune that comes to himself. This attitude goes to make for loneliness. To find greater happiness in your own life, you should share and welcome happiness in your neighbor's good fortune. What a privilege it is to love people and rejoice with them.

The hymn writer C. D. Meigs expressed the idea this way: "Lord, help me live from day to day in such a self-forgetful way that even when I kneel to pray my prayer shall be for others. Others, Lord, yes, others, let this my motto be, help me to live for others, that I may live like Thee."

Youth Week brought to the attention of the church a word with meaning and application. The theme of the youth pastor, Kevin Curling, centered in that word — Commitment!

This word flows in our ears so easily. Often we confuse the spiritual significance of the word being tied into genuine service. Reviewing a book about a former First Lady of the United States, Marylin Bender wrote in the New York Times Book Review "... The former First Lady emerges as a lonely, uncommitted and misdirected woman of heroic strengths that she seems only able to summon when facing disaster. In tranquil times, she fritters away her intelligence and numerous talents."

How tragic to let exceptional gifts dribble away, and to be uncommitted in an age when commitment and dedication are so important and necessary.

To whom and what are you really committed? Commitment means direction! On a trip I passed a truck owned by a construction company. There was a large sign attached to the back of the truck which read, "Pilot Car - Follow Me." The truck was used to lead travelers in convoys going around the construction sites. In the same way Jesus says, "Follow me", and "Take up the cross", this is one obligation the Christian will never finish. It is something you do primarily for Jesus' sake. Paul said, "O Timothy, keep that which is committed to thy trust."

What does the word commitment mean to you? Prayer when there is a crisis? Attending Sunday Worship Services spasmodically? Giving money to God's work periodically? Serving God for self-glory?

Christian commitment means total obedience to God's will, surrendering complete control of your life to Him, and confidence in the certainty of His guidance. Psa. 37:5.
